

HEPATITIS B IMMUNE STATUS

About This Test

The Hepatitis B Antibody test also called an Immune Status test, is used to detect the presence of antibodies to the hepatitis A virus.

- If antibodies are detected (Positive result) you are protected (immune) from getting Hepatitis B.
- If antibodies are NOT detected (Negative result) you are susceptible to the virus and could potentially get the disease.

The word "Hepatitis" means inflammation of the liver. When the liver is inflamed or damaged, its function can be affected. Hepatitis is most often caused by a virus. Hepatitis B is a contagious disease that results from infection with the Hepatitis B virus.

When first infected, a person can develop an acute infection, ranging in severity from a very mild illness with few or no symptoms to a serious condition requiring hospitalization. Acute Hepatitis B refers to the first 6 months after someone is exposed to the virus. Some people are able to fight the infection and clear the virus while others suffer from a lifelong illness (chronic).

Not everyone has symptoms with acute Hepatitis B, especially young children. Most adults have symptoms that appear within 3 months of exposure and include: fever, tiredness, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, gray stool, dark urine, joint pain, and jaundice. Many people with chronic Hepatitis B do not know they are infected however the virus can still be detected in the blood and may spread to other people.

What Should I Do With My Results?

It is always recommended that you meet with a doctor to determine what your laboratory test results mean to you. Your doctor will review all of your test results and, combined with your health history, he or she will be able to provide an accurate picture of your health status.

If your result was POSITIVE: A positive result can mean that you have been exposed to the virus in the past, or you have had the vaccine. These antibodies will most likely protect you from future Hepatitis infections.

If your result was NEGATIVE: A negative result means no Hepatitis B antibodies were detected. If exposed to the virus, you would be susceptible to the disease. Since antibody levels may decrease over time, it is possible to get this result even if you have previously had Hepatitis B or have taken the Hepatitis B vaccine. Consult your doctor to determine if a vaccine would be appropriate for you.

If your result was EQUIVOCAL OR BORDERLINE: Your result is in between a positive and a negative. It means we could not determine if you are immune to the Hepatitis B virus. Consult your doctor to see if a vaccine would be appropriate for you.
