

PROTHROMBIN TIME WITH INR

About This Test

Prothrombin Time and International Normalized Ratio is also known as PT/INR. A PT test is used to help detect and diagnose a bleeding disorder, excessive clotting disorder, or to monitor certain medications.

The INR is calculated from a PT result and is used to determine how well blood-thinning medication, like warfarin (Coumadin®), is working. The INR calculation adjusts for changes in reagents and test methodologies so that results are comparable from different testing laboratories.

What Should I Do With My Results?

Normal Results: A PT/INR test has a normal reference range of PT 11.7-13.9 seconds and an INR of 0.9-1.1. If you are taking a blood thinner such as Coumadin®, there is a therapeutic range of INR 2.0-3.0 for conventional anticoagulation or an INR 2.5-3.5 for more intensive anticoagulation. Your medical provider will know your target INR.

Abnormal Results: If your INR is greater than >8.0 this is critical and could lead to excessive bleeding. You should contact a physician as soon as possible to discuss an abnormal INR result.

Test Information

CompuNet's PT/INR test is performed by mechanical clot detection. Mechanical clot detection virtually eliminates any specimen color interferences.
