

KRATOM (MITRAGYNINE)

About This Test

This test is a urine drug test to check for the presence of Mitragynine, also known as Kratom, a tropical plant from Southeast Asia whose leaves are used for their stimulant and pain-relieving effects. Kratom's increased use for self-treatment of pain, anxiety, and opioid withdrawal has raised concerns about its potential for abuse and addiction. This drug is typically found the form of a capsule, tablet, or extract, which can be used in vaping solutions. This is a legal substance that is readily available.

What Should I Do With My Results?

It is always recommended that you meet with a doctor to determine what your laboratory test results mean to you. Your doctor will review all of your test results and, combined with your health history, will be able to provide an accurate picture of your health status.

Positive results in a urine drug screen could indicate compliance of prescribed medications or recent use of other medications which can suggest misuse of prescription medications, illicit drug use, or potential substance abuse, and may require further evaluation or intervention.
